Bilingual Master's (MAM)

MOU with Discípulo 21

After two years of collaboration, conversations and negotiations, the Asbury Latino Center and Discípulo 21 signed a Memorandum of Understanding to create a partnership that provides accredited theological education for members of Discípulo 21.

Discípulo 21 is a church-planting network of Latino/a congregations and leaders in the United States and Latin America. Their focus is to nurture missionally-minded congregations that will equip and deploy leaders (both lay and ordained) that would plant churches in their communities and beyond.

Discípulo 21 operates under the leadership of Rev. Dr. Iosmar Álvarez, who is the District Superintendent of the Lexington District, Kentucky Conference of the United Methodist Church, and a Doctor of Ministry graduate of Asbury Theological Seminary.

New Publication

In March 2019, The Excellence in Preaching Initiative, a Project of the Asbury Latino Center published a book on basic skills for preaching.

The book, titled *Predicando con Impacto: Preparación y Presentación de Mensajes Bíblicos*, was the result of a collaboration of five Latino/a Homiletics and Biblical scholars with the purpose of developing a resource for preachers (both novice and advanced practitioners) on various skills used in the preparation and delivery of sermons.

The book is written in Spanish and published by First Fruits, the academic - open access publisher of Asbury Theological Seminary. The book was edited by Danny Román-Gloró Director of Strategic Initiatives of the Asbury Latino Center, who also contributed one of the chapters in the book.

Latino Ministry Formation Program Re-Certified

The Latino Ministry Formation Program (LMFP) was re-certified as an access to Seminary program by the Asociación para la Educación Teológica Hispana (AETH)

AETH and the Association for Theological Education (ATS) entered into an agreement in which AETH can certify programs that function as equivalent to a bachelor's degree for purposes of admission into Seminary. This is the 5th year of this certification.

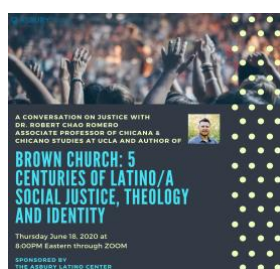
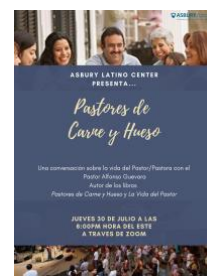
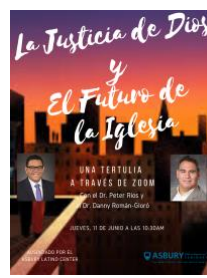
